- Vectran laminate race sails by North and Sobstad include light/medium and medium/heavy number one genoas, no. 3, 4 and mainsail. Three spinnakers by North Sails, Masthead Spinnaker, North Code Zero, North 3DL No 3 and 4, Masthead and Fractional Asymmetrics, Bowsprit, staysail, jibtop
- Deck equipment is improved for ease of sail adjustments under load and extra strength where required
- underwater foils and hull carefully prepared
- Polar performance charts, tuning notes, tack/gybe angles laminated and displayed
- For 2009 new gear includes improved bowsprit, tapered halyards, McMurdo Smartfind epirb with gps, McMurdo Navtex, double battery power and laptop with routing software. Plus additional saloon storage for the Fastnet

Application to Fastnet 2009 campaign

- During the training weekend(s), qualifying races and the Fastnet itself to pass on to the crew the knowledge accumulated from previous experiences
- To assist the crew to blend and to share and develop their experience and abilities
- And in doing so to sail the 40.7 to the best of our joint skills whilst mindful of the safety issues involved and keeping a sense of proportion and enjoyment

➤ What is involved?

The biennial Rolex Fastnet Race is considered one of the world's classic ocean races. The 608-mile course is a test for skippers and crews with its tricky tidal currents and changeable weather conditions. The race is organised by the Royal Ocean Racing Club, with the Royal Yacht Squadron and the Royal Western Yacht Club, Plymouth.

The Royal Ocean Racing Club's classic event is regularly oversubscribed and is limited to 300 yachts every two years. The course will take the large fleet South West down the Solent, past the Needles and out into the English Channel. The headlands along the South Coast of England - Anvil Point, Portland Bill, Start Point, The Lizard, Lands End - must each be weathered on the way to the open ocean and the leg North West to the Fastnet Rock with its mythical lighthouse*. The return leg to Plymouth, via the Bishop Rock Lighthouse on the South side of the Scilly Isles, is just as demanding, as fatigue and competition take their toll.

Like no other race the Rolex Fastnet Race attracts every type of sailor and boat from just about every sailing country in the world. Sailing schools, corporate institutions, family owned and crewed cruiser-racers, dedicated amateurs, club sailors along with the hardened champions from the Grand Prix circuits, are all attracted to compete in the best known offshore race in the world. **All come to enjoy the challenge of one of the trickiest and most demanding sporting events that an individual or a team can aspire to.**

As crew you must race over 300 miles with your intended Fastnet crew and yacht, during the 12 months prior to the race. The Fastnet is an endurance yacht race and is not easy. You need commitment and enthusiasm to do well. During the course of the training and the race itself you will develop and use all your sailing and communication skills and you will find the campaign a personal challenge, but also immensely satisfying when you complete it. Our aim is to make sure that everyone has fun and enjoys the challenge.

Training weekend

- 25th -26th April

RORC qualifying races

- 25th-27th May Myth of Malham 230nm Race round the infamous Eddystone Lighthouse
- 26th – 28th June Morgan Cup 75-175nm zig zag to Cherbourg
- 18th-19th July Refresher training weekend offshore

RORC Fastnet Race

- 8th – 14th Aug Preparation, 620nm Fastnet Race, Plymouth party, optional free trip back to Cowes

The training and qualifying race weekends will be structured so that all the required manoeuvres are thoroughly gone through as well as philosophic approaches, team bonding and working on boat speed.

Also the boat equipment, sail inventory, safety compliance and methods of achieving a constant best vmg will be investigated.

The races will of course involve more planning, dissipation of duties, entries, compliance, and actual tactics, racing, eating and sleeping. All to be best prepared for the Fastnet but also to enjoy the build up.

The cost of £2,450 may be paid in instalments by direct debit, credit card or cheque. It includes the following:

- boat with comprehensive race sails, extensive safety equipment, bottom scrubbed
- qualified and experienced skipper and mate if required (depends on crew levels)
- race entry fees, food onboard during racing, diesel, water, gas
- berthing fees, accommodation onboard
- Fastnet campaign rugby shirt, Team Anticipation racing and trim notes
- and for those able to participate they may like to join us for the local Tuesday evening races during 2009
- well over 1,000 qualifying sea miles towards your logged RYA qualifications

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Deposit to secure your place £300, payments may be made monthly, final balance due by end of June 2009.
